True Blue Bay Resort

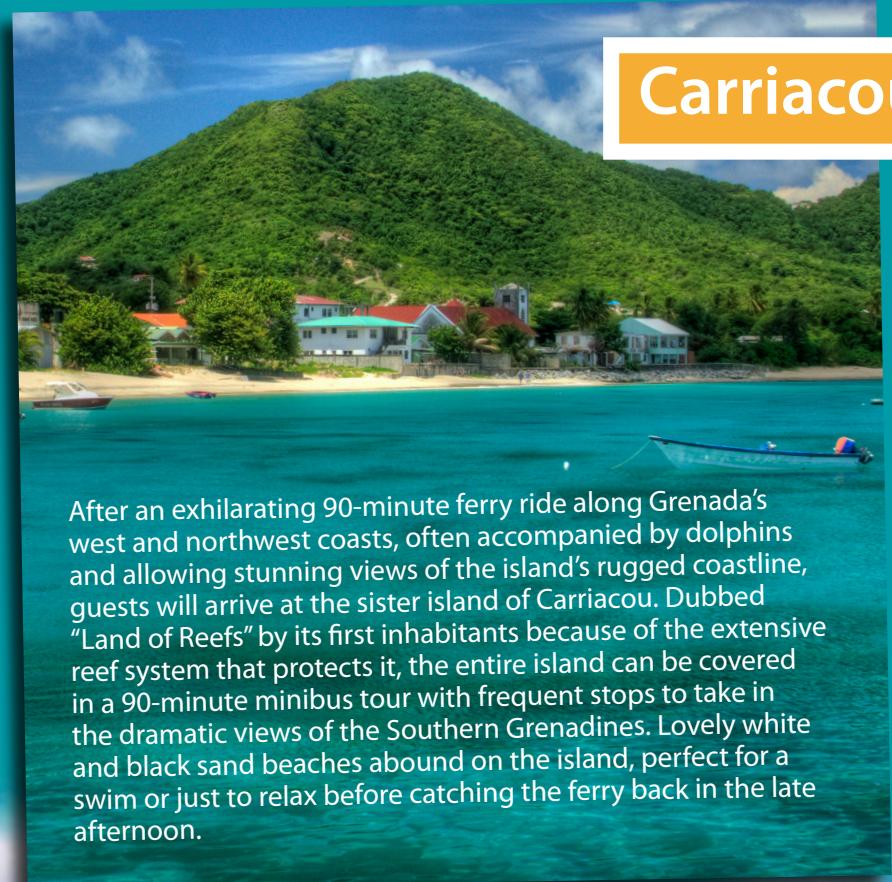

Carriacou



After an exhilarating 90-minute ferry ride along Grenada's west and northwest coasts, often accompanied by dolphins and allowing stunning views of the island's rugged coastline, guests will arrive at the sister island of Carriacou. Dubbed "Land of Reefs" by its first inhabitants because of the extensive reef system that protects it, the entire island can be covered in a 90-minute minibus tour with frequent stops to take in the dramatic views of the Southern Grenadines. Lovely white and black sand beaches abound on the island, perfect for a swim or just to relax before catching the ferry back in the late afternoon.



River Antoine Rum Distillery



Rum Connection

Considered the oldest continuous working rum distillery in the southern Caribbean (operating since 1785), River Antoine still produces a variety of rum products. Full tours are conducted, followed by tasting of the spirits. Only recommended for the brave and strong-willed.

Telescope Mangrove Nursery (Seacology project site)

Our newest project in Grenada, launched in February 2014, is preparing thousands of mangrove seedlings to be replanted along a section of coastline in East St. Andrew's Parish. These trees, once numerous in the area, will provide protection from storms and support vital fisheries for four Grenadian communities.

Grand Etang National Park

The most popular area in Grenada for hiking and trekking is undoubtedly the rainforest around the Grand Etang Forest Reserve, high up in the mountains of the island's interior. Grand Etang's varied elevations and terrains maintain several different ecological subsystems, culminating in the elfin woodlands high up the slopes of the reserve's central mountains. The trails are quite good, and the Forest Reserve provides excellent guides, both written and human.

The third Seacology project in Grenada provided for the installation of three viewing platforms and interpretative wildlife signage within the reserve.

Moliniere-Beausejour Marine Protected Area, on the southwest coast is the home of a stunning underwater sculpture park, the first of its kind in the world, and one of the most popular dive and snorkel sites in the country. Experienced divers will also have a chance to explore the wreck of the Bianca C, an Italian cruise liner which sank in 1961.

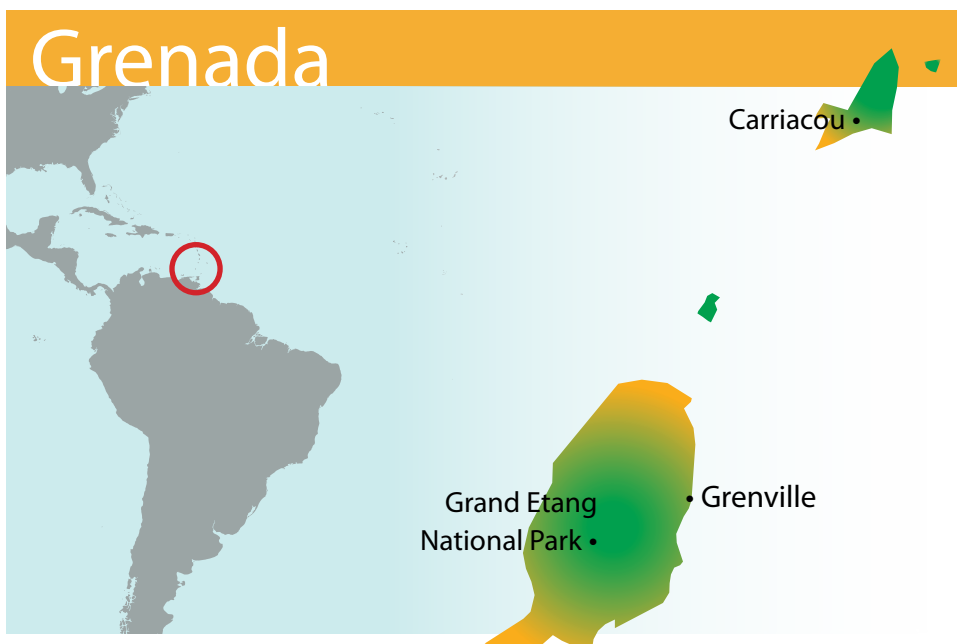
