Escape the winter chill to this incredible Caribbean island nation, and spend a week experiencing its unique ecosystems, culture, and cuisine.



True Blue Bay Resort

Guests at the Green Globe-certified resort will enjoy unparalleled luxury in either a standard or suite room. With stunning views of its namesake True Blue Bay, the resort is located at Grenada's southern tip and only a 20-minute drive from the center of St. Georges, the capital city. The family-run facility offers diving and snorkeling, and tours of the surrounding area, as well as drinks, dining, and live entertainment at the Dodgy Dock, its onsite restaurant.

River Antoine Rum Distillery



Considered the oldest continuous working rum distillery in the southern Caribbean (operating since 1785), River Antoine still produces a variety of rum products. Full tours are conducted, followed by tasting of the spirits. Only recommended for the brave and strong-willed.

Telescope Mangrove Nursery (Seacology project site)

Our newest project in Grenada, launched in February 2014, is preparing thousands of mangrove seedlings to be replanted along a section of coastline in East St. Andrew's Parish. These trees, once numerous in the area, will provide protection from storms and support vital fisheries for four Grenadian communities.





The most popular area in Grenada for hiking and trekking is undoubtedly the rainforest around the Grand Etang Forest Reserve, high up in the mountains of the island's interior. Grand Etang's varied elevations and terrains maintain several different ecological subsystems, culminating in the elfin woodlands high up the slopes of the reserve's central mountains. The trails are quite good, and the Forest Reserve provides excellent guides, both written and human.

The third Seacology project in Grenada provided for the installation of three viewing platforms and interpretative wildlife signage within the reserve.


