XPLORE Tanzania, including Zanzibar and little-known Chumbe Island, on an 11-night trip that departs Feb. 16.

respectively. Seacology is a nonprofit organization focused on the preservation of island biodiversity worldwide. "Seacology trips go where tourists could never go in a million years," said spokesman Duane Silverstein. "We fund local villages. We then can take our guests to ceremonies that no one else would ever see."

The group will travel in 4-wheel-drive vehicles to look for game in Lake Manyara National Park and the Ngorongoro Conservation Area. The park is home to gazelles, hippopotamuses, baboons, giraffes and more than 400 species of birds.

The animal population of Ngorongoro numbers about 25,000; it is one of the best places in Africa to see the rare black rhino.
